FACULTY BIOGRAPHIES

Pianist **REBECCA PENNEYS** is a recitalist, chamber musician, orchestral soloist, educator, and adjudicator. For over six decades she has been hailed as a pianist of prodigious talent. Rebecca has played throughout the USA, East Asia, Australia, New Zealand, South America, Europe, Middle East, and Canada. She is a popular guest artist, keynote speaker and teacher, nationally and internationally. She is an exclusive Steinway Artist and has given many concerts for Steinway & Sons. Combining a busy concert schedule with seminars and master classes worldwide, she has taught international students at Eastman School of Music for thirty-seven years, at the Chautauqua Music Festival for thirty-four years, and at RPPF for five years. Her current and former students include prizewinners in international competitions and hold important teaching posts on every continent.

Rebecca made her recital debut at age 9, and performed as soloist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra when she was 11. At 17, after winning many young artist competitions in the USA she was awarded the unprecedented Special Critics' Prize at the Seventh International Chopin Piano Competition in Warsaw, an award created in her honor. Additionally, she won the Most Outstanding Musician Prize at the Fifth Vianna Da Motta International Piano Competition (Portugal) and was top prizewinner in the Second Paloma O'Shea International Piano Competition (Spain). She made her New York Debut in Alice Tully Hall in 1972. In 1974, she founded the acclaimed New Arts Trio, which twice won the prestigious Naumburg Award for Chamber Music (New York City).

In July 2017, Rebecca became Professor Emerita of Piano at Eastman School of Music. She became Artist-in-Residence at St. Petersburg College in 2001, and since 2015 she holds a courtesy position as Steinway-Artist-in-Residence at the University of South Florida. She has been director of the St Petersburg Piano Series in Florida since 2007, founder-pianist of the Salon Chamber Music Series at the Rochester Academy of Medicine since 1997, and founder-director of Eastman Piano Series at the Summit since 2009. Rebecca launched the Rebecca Penneys Friends of Piano (non-profit 501c3) and the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival in 2013. The University of South Florida in Tampa hosts the tuition-free festival every July. RPPF-Mini, a 5-day seminar for strategies in career development for pianists, will launch in January 2018 at St Petersburg College Gibbs Campus.

Rebecca's teachers include Aube Tzerko, Leonard Stein, Rosina Lhevinne, Artur Rubinstein, Menahem Pressler, Gyorgy Sebok, Janos Starker, Josef Gingold, and Iannis Xenakis. She has taught and performed in such summer festivals as Sitka, Marlboro, Eastern, Aspen, Vermont Mozart, Montreal, Tel Hai Israel, Shawnigan Johannesen, Peninsula, Roycroft, Mammoth Lakes, and Music Mountain. Rebecca has more than a dozen current CDs on Fleur De Son Classics and Centaur Records. Her 1st DVD for Naxos will be released in September 2017 with music

of Brahms, Debussy, and De Falla. Her 2nd DVD celebrates the music of Chopin, and DVD No. 3 underscores the spirituality of Brahms and enjoys Soler, Scarlatti, and piano rags. Visit her online at www.rebeccapenneys.com & www.rebeccapenneyspianofestival.org

Acclaimed for his "elegant poetry and virtuosic fire", **ALAN CHOW** has won First Prize in the Concert Artists Guild International Competition, the UCLA International Piano Competition and the Palm Beach Invitational International Piano Competition. Winner of the Silver Medal and Audience Favorite Prize at the Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition, he was also a prizewinner in the William Kapell International Piano Competition.

A Steinway Artist, Mr. Chow has performed in recital and in concert with orchestras from coast to coast in 47 states. His recitals have brought him to the major music centers including New York (Lincoln Center, Merkin Hall, Steinway Hall), Boston, Los Angeles, Chicago (Symphony Center and Ravinia), Washington, D.C., Cleveland, Seattle, Atlanta, New Orleans, and Miami. Concerto performances include appearances with the National Symphony, Utah Symphony, Oakland Symphony, Tulsa Philharmonic, Kansas City Symphony and Omaha Symphony. Mr. Chow regularly tours Asia with performances in China, Japan, Hong Kong, Taiwan, and Singapore including performances with the Hong Kong Philharmonic and the Pan-Asia Symphony. An avid chamber musician, he has collaborated with the American, Pacifica, and Miami String Quartets and has been guest artist at the Grand Canyon Chamber Music Festival, Juneau Jazz and Classics, San Juan Islands Chamber Music Festival, Kent Blossom Music Festival, Texas Music Festival, Music Festival of Arkansas, and Music Mountain. He also appears in joint recital engagements in the Cheng-Chow Trio with pianists Angela Cheng and Alvin Chow.

Also in demand for his teaching, Mr. Chow has given master classes throughout North America, Europe and Asia at conservatories, universities, and summer festivals including the Eastman School of Music, Indiana University, New Orleans International Piano Festival, Gina Bachauer International Piano Festival, Las Vegas Piano Festival, Classical Music Festival (Austria), Shanghai International Piano Festival (Taiwan), and in Singapore. Appointed Guest Professor at the Central Conservatory in Beijing and Honored Visiting Professor at the Shenyang Conservatory, he has also presented recitals, master classes, and lectures in China at the conservatories in Shanghai, Chengdu, Xian, and Wuhan.

Mr. Chow studied with Nelita True at the University of Maryland where he graduated Co-Valedictorian with his twin brother Alvin, and received the Charles Manning Prize in the Creative and Performing Arts given to the outstanding

graduate; with Sascha Gorodnitzki at The Juilliard School where he was awarded the Victor Herbert Prize in Piano; and with Menahem Pressler at Indiana University where he was the recipient of the Joseph Battista Memorial Scholarship. He also studied at the Mozarteum Sommerakademie with Carlo Zecchi.

Formerly Artist-in-Residence at the University of Arkansas, Mr. Chow most recently served as a member of the artist faculty at the Northwestern University Bienen School of Music. In the fall of 2013, he also held the position of Visiting Associate Professor of Piano at Oberlin Conservatory. He will join the piano faculty at the Eastman School of Music in the fall of 2017.

Pianist **TANNIS GIBSON** has been heard in concert halls throughout North America, Europe, Asia, and South America. Venues include Weill Recital Hall (Carnegie), the Kennedy Center, Merkin Hall, Corcoran Gallery, National Gallery of Art, and the Gardner Museum in Boston. Her festival performances include the Bath Festival in England, ppIANISSIMO festival in Sofia, Bulgaria, Chile's Jornados Musicales de Invierno, Banff Festival of the Arts in Canada, and New York's Bang-on-a-Can and Weekend of Chamber Music Festivals. Recently, Gibson toured major cities throughout China as concerto soloist with the Southern Arizona Symphony Orchestra.

Gibson has recorded for CRI, ASV (London), Naxos, JRI, The Classics Label, and Summit Records. Her CD *Song of the Birds* with cellist, Nancy Green, was chosen as "CD of the Fortnight" by Classical Music magazine in London, England. The Monticello Trio's CD of Nicholas Maw's *Piano Trio*, with Gibson as pianist, was nominated for a Gramophone Award in London and selected as "Editor's Choice" by Gramophone Magazine. She has been featured in live performance on "Morning Pro Musica" at WGBH Boston and WQXR's "The Listening Room" in New York. She has been heard on NPR's nationally broadcast "Performance Today" on numerous occasions and has also appeared on the *Today Show* (NBC).

A champion of music of our time, Gibson's past projects include commissions and premieres of works by many of todays' composers. She has worked alongside such composers as Steve Reich, Nicholas Maw, Joan Tower, Barbara Kolb, Martin Bresnick, John Harbison, David Lang, Andrew Waggoner, Craig Walsh, Dan Asia, and others. Her premieres in major cities throughout the US include New York, Boston, Washington and San Francisco.

Gibson's students achieve recognition through prizes in international, national, and local competitions. They have appeared in notable series and venues such as NPR's From The Top, Carnegie (Weill) Recital Hall, and the Dame Myra Hess Series in Chicago. Several hold faculty positions in institutions throughout the United States. Her 23 years of dedicated teaching include residencies and masterclasses at

conservatories and institutions throughout the globe.

Gibson holds a B.M. from the University of Regina in Canada where she was a student of William Moore, and a M.M. from the Juilliard School as a scholarship student of Sascha Gorodnitzki and Herbert Stessin. She attended the Banff Center Winter Cycle in Canada for two seasons followed by a year of private study in Brussels with Eduardo del Pueyo and Arthur Grumiaux.

From 2011-2014, she was appointed Distinguished Visiting Artist at Azusa Pacific University in Los Angeles. As an artistic producer, she has served as Co-Artistic Director for Coyote Consort and the Albemarle Chamber Music Series at the University of Virginia. Currently, Gibson resides in Tucson where she is Assistant Director to the School of Music at The University of Arizona. As Professor of Music, she teaches studio piano and chamber music and serves as Area Coordinator for Keyboard and Strings. In July 2017, she was appointed as Interim Dean of the College of Fine Arts for the University of Arizona.

RAY GOTTLIEB, O.D., Ph.D, is a behavioral optometrist, who teaches about vision and learning improvement. He presents at optometry, education, health, and psychology conferences worldwide and conducts programs for schools, industry, and the general public.

Born in Los Angeles, and educated at the University of California, School of Optometry and Saybrook Graduate School, his Ph.D. dissertation covered neurological and psychological aspects of nearsightedness. He also has a diploma in massage therapy from the New School of Massage in Sebastopol, CA (1979). He was on the academic optometry faculty at the University of Houston, College of Optometry (1965-68) and on the clinical faculty of the University of California, Berkeley, School of Optometry and the University of Rochester, School of Medicine. In the 1980's he was research editor of the Brain/Mind Bulletin, a newsletter about brain research, creativity, education, human health and potential.

Certified in vision therapy by the College of Optometrists in Vision Development, he is a member of the NeuroOptometric Rehabilitation Association (brain trauma rehabilitation), the Optometric Extension Program, PAVE (Parents Advocating for Vision Education), and has been the Dean of the College of Syntonic Optometry since 1979. Syntonic Optometry is a therapy using color for improving visual problems related to eye health, learning/reading disability and brain trauma.

Dr. Gottlieb has invented eye exercises and written articles on myopia (nearsightedness), presbyopia (bifocalsightedness), syntonics (color) therapy, behavioral optometry, education (curriculum development), and brain theory (the phase-conjugate, optical brain). He has written two books: *Attention and Memory*

Training: Stress-Point Learning on the Trampoline and The Fundamentals of Flow in Learning Music (with Rebecca Penneys). His exercise to eliminate presbyopia has been translated into five languages and has also been made into a video program called "The Read Without Glasses Method."

For over twenty years he practiced vision therapy in Rochester, New York, working with learning and attention disorders, brain trauma rehabilitation, myopia and presbyopia prevention, and cross-eye/lazy-eye. He was Staff Optometrist at the Rochester Psychiatric Center, and Consultant-Trainer for the Rochester City School District. He spent twenty summers on the faculty at the Chautauqua Piano Festival Program where he worked with the pianists to improve learning, attention, and stress management skills, and he is now the Attention and Memory Specialist for the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival. He lives in St Pete Beach, Florida.

Pianist CHRISTOPHER HARDING maintains an international performance career, generating acclaim through his substantive interpretations and pianistic mastery. He has given solo, concerto, and chamber music performances in the Kennedy Center and Phillips Collection in Washington, D.C., Suntory Hall in Tokyo, the National Theater Concert Hall in Taipei, the Jack Singer Concert Hall in Calgary, and in Newfoundland, Israel, Romania, and China. His concerto performances have included concerts with the National Symphony and the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestras, the San Angelo and Santa Barbara Symphonies, and the Tokyo City Philharmonic, under such conductors as Andrew Sewell, Eric Zhou, Taijiro Iimori, Gisele Ben-Dor, Fabio Machetti, Randall Craig Fleisher, John DeMain, Ron Spiegelman, Daniel Alcott, and Darryl One. His chamber music collaborations have included renowned artists such as clarinetist Karl Leister, flautist Andras Adorjan, and members of the St. Lawrence and Ying String Quartets, in addition to projects with colleagues at the University of Michigan. He has recorded solo and chamber music CDs for the Equilibrium and Brevard Classics labels. He has additionally edited and published critical editions and recordings of works by Claude Debussy (Children's Corner, Arabesques and shorter works) and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (Viennese Sonatinas) for the Schirmer Performance Editions published by Hal Leonard.

Professor Harding has presented master classes and lecture recitals across the United States and Asia, as well as in Israel and Canada. His recent tours to Taiwan, Hong Kong, and mainland China included presentations and master classes at Hong Kong Baptist University, National Taiwan Normal University, SooChow University, the National Taiwan University of Education, and conservatories and universities in Beijing (Central and China Conservatories), Tianjin, Shanghai, Hefei, Guangzhou, Shenyang, Dalien, and Chongqing. He has additionally performed and lectured numerous times in Seoul, including lecture recitals and classes at Seoul National University, Ewha Women's University, and Dong Duk University. He

served extended tours as a Fulbright Senior Specialist at the Sichuan Conservatory of Music in Chengdu, China (2008), and also at Seoul National University (2011). While teaching at SNU, he simultaneously held a Special Chair in Piano at Ewha Womans' University.

In addition to teaching undergraduate and graduate piano performance and chamber music at the University of Michigan School of Music, Theatre & Dance, Harding serves on the faculty of the Indiana University Summer Piano Academy and is a frequent guest artist and teacher at the MasterWorks Festival. Recent summer festivals include the Chautauqua Institution and the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival.

Harding was born of American parents in Munich, Germany and raised in Northern Virginia. He worked with Milton Kidd at the American University Department of Performing Arts Preparatory Division and was trained in the traditions of Tobias Matthay. His collegiate studies were with Menahem Pressler and Nelita True. Harding has taken 25 first prizes in national and international competitions and in 1999 was awarded the "Mozart Prize" at the Cleveland International Piano Competition. His current recording projects include the Brahms viola/clarinet sonatas and the clarinet trio, with clarinetist Dan Gilbert, violist Stephen Boe, and cellist Yeonjin Kim.

Praised for an abundance of technique and beautiful array of colors, pianist **EUNMI KO** (eunmiko.com) has appeared in the Weill Hall at Carnegie Hall, John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, COMA 16 Festival de Musica Contemporanea, Festival Cervantino Internacional, Chautauqua Music Festival, Real Conservatorio Superior de Musica de Madrid, Seoul Arts Center, Eastman School of Music, CLUSTER, Consorzio Liberi Musicisti, World Piano Conference, and Music Since 1900 Conference, among others. Ko performs a wide range of piano repertoire from premieres of new works by living composers to traditional and rarely played piano works. Recently, she has been a guest artist/teacher at Universidad Alfonso X el Sabio, Ohio University, University of Maryland, Lynn University, University of Florida, University of Tennessee, Eastern Michigan University, Florida International University, and Ying Wa College, among others.

As an active chamber musician, Ko is co-founder and co-director of the new music ensemble *Strings & Hammers*, which has the unusual instrumentation of violin, piano, and double bass. Each year, *Strings and Hammers* collaborates with composers from around the world and gives dozens of premieres. From 2015 to 2017, Ko has collaborated with the McCormick Percussion Group for the Concerti for Piano and Percussion Project. The project includes the co-commission of piano concerti from Matt Barber, Seunghee Lee, John Liberatore, Ciro Scotto, and Baljinder Sekhon; four world premiere concerts during the years of 2015, 2016,

and 2017; and a commercial recording release.

Ko holds a B.M. degree from Seoul National University and graduate degrees (MM and DMA) from the Eastman School of Music where she studied with Rebecca Penneys. Ko is Assistant Professor of Piano and co-advisor of the New-Music Consortium at the University of South Florida. Since 2013, she has also been on the faculty at the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival. Ko may be heard on the recently published CD releases: *She Rose, and Let Me In* and *Musical Landscapes of Hilary Tann*.

A native of Los Angeles, **NORMAN KRIEGER** is one of the most acclaimed pianists of his generation and is highly regarded as an artist of depth, sensitivity and virtuosic flair. As the Los Angeles Times put it, "Krieger owns a world of technique – take that for granted. He always knows exactly where he is going and what he is doing. He never for an instant miscalculates. He communicates urgently but with strict control. He is alert to every manner of nuance and at every dynamic level his tone flatters the ear."

Myung -Whun Chung, Donald Runnicles, Leonard Slatkin, Michael Tilson Thomas, Jaap van Zweden, and Zubin Mehta are just a few of the conductors with whom Krieger has collaborated. Krieger regularly appears with the major orchestras of North America, among them the New York Philharmonic, Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Chicago Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra and the National Symphony. He has performed throughout Europe, Asia and South America including tours of Germany, France, Poland, Holland Scandinavia, Korea, China, New Zealand, and Israel. He recently performed at the PyeongChang Music festival in Korea. In September 2014, he recorded the Brahms Sonata Op. 1 and the Piano Concerto No. 2 with the London Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Philip Ryan Mann, which will be released on Decca.

In recital, Krieger has appeared throughout the United States, Europe, Mexico, and Asia, while chamber music collaborations have included appearances with soprano Sheri Greenawald, violinists Paul Huang, Sarah Chang, Pamela Frank and Mihaela Martin, violist Nobuko Imai, cellists Myung Wha Chung, Jian Wang, Edward Aaron and Frans Helmersen as well as the Tokyo string quartet. His debut at New York City's prestigious Carnegie Hall and Mostly Mozart Festival earned him an immediate invitation to Lincoln Center's Great Performers Series. Krieger made headlines by being named the Gold Medal Winner of the first Palm Beach Invitational Piano Competition.

He began his studies in Los Angeles under the tutelage of Esther Lipton. At age 15, he became a full-scholarship student of Adele Marcus at The Juilliard School where he earned both his Bachelor and Master degrees. Subsequently, he studied with Alfred Brendel and Maria Curcio in London and earned an Artist Diploma

from the New England Conservatory, where he worked with Russell Sherman.

A champion of contemporary music, he features the music of John Adams, Leonard Bernstein, John Corigliano, Daniel Brewbaker, Donald Crockett, Judith St. Croix, Lukas Foss, Henri Lazarof and Lowell Liebermann among his active repertoire.

Krieger is the founding artistic director of The Prince Albert Music Festival in Hawaii. Since 2008, he has served on the summer faculty at the Brevard Music Festival in North Carolina. From 1997 to 2016 he was a professor at the Thornton School of Music at the University of Southern California. In August 2016 he was appointed Professor of Piano at the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University.

STEVEN LAITZ is currently Professor and Chair of Music Theory and Analysis, and Assistant Dean of Curricular Development at the Juilliard School. From 1990-2014, Laitz served as Professor of Music Theory and Chair at the Eastman School of Music. Laitz has served as visiting professor at the New England Conservatory and was appointed Visiting Professor at Shanghai Conservatory in 2015. He is Director of the Gail Boyd de Stwolinski Center for Music Theory Pedagogy at the University of Oklahoma, Editor in Chief of the Journal of Music Theory Pedagogy and Executive Editor of Music Theory Pedagogy Online. He has delivered lectures and presented master classes throughout the U.S., Europe, China, and Australia. He is the author of numerous articles and textbooks, including The Complete Musician: An Integrated Approach to Theory, Analysis, and Listening (4th edition) and Graduate Review of Tonal Theory: A Recasting of Common-Practice Harmony, Form, and Counterpoint, both published by Oxford University Press. He has created three online music theory courses for the Eastman School and two courses for the Juilliard School.

MICHAEL LEWIN is one of America's best-known and most recorded concert pianists, concertizing in 30 countries. His career was launched with top prizes in the Liszt International Competition, the American Pianists Association Award, and the Kapell International Piano Competition. In 2014 he won a Grammy Award for his featured performance on "Winds of Samsara." He has appeared as soloist with the Netherlands Philharmonic, Cairo Symphony, China National Radio Orchestra, Bucharest Philharmonic, Youth Orchestra of the Americas, State Symphony of Greece, Moscow Chamber Orchestra, the Boston Pops, and the Phoenix, Indianapolis, Miami, North Carolina, West Virginia, Nevada, New Orleans, Colorado, Guadalajara, and Puerto Rico Symphonies. Mr. Lewin has performed in New York's Lincoln Center, Boston's Symphony Hall, Taiwan's National Concert Hall, Hong Kong's City Hall Theatre, Holland's Muziekcentrum, Moscow's Great Hall, the Athens Megaron, London's Wigmore Hall, the National Gallery of Art,

the Newport, Ravinia and Spoleto Festivals, and on PBS Television. His extensive repertoire includes over 40 piano concertos, with particular interest in the music of Beethoven, Brahms, Chopin, Liszt, Debussy, and American composers. His acclaimed recordings include the complete piano music of Charles T. Griffes, Scarlatti Sonatas, "Michael Lewin plays Liszt," a Russian Recital, "Bamboula!" piano music of Louis Moreau Gottschalk, the Bolcom Violin Sonatas with Irina Muresanu, "Piano Phantoms" and "If I Were a Bird." He most recently released a pair of Debussy recordings on Sono Luminus, "Beau Soir" and "Starry Night", which include the complete Préludes and other works. Lewin is a Juilliard School graduate and a Steinway Artist. One of America's most sought-after teachers, he is Professor at the Boston Conservatory at Berklee, directs the Boston Conservatory Piano Masters Series and has mentored many prize-winning pianists. www.michaellewin.com

Praised by audiences and critics alike for his fresh interpretations and dramatic presentation style, YOSHIKAZU NAGAI has performed as soloist and chamber musician throughout Asia, Europe and America in the Shanghai Concert Hall in China, National Recital Hall in Taiwan, Carnegie Recital Hall and Merkin Concert Hall in New York, Kennedy Center's Terrace Theatre, The National Gallery and Phillips Collection in Washington D.C., and Seattle's Benaroya Hall. His schedule in recent seasons includes recitals in Naples, Seoul, Guangzhou, Hong Kong, Shanghai, Singapore, Beijing, Cincinnati, Chicago, San Francisco and in recent collaborations with the Ives Quartet, violinists Robert Mann, and Anthony Marwood. Born in Germany and raised in the United States, Nagai studied with John Perry at Rice University, Paul Schenly and Sergei Babayan at the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he was awarded the Malvina Podis Prize in Piano, and Duane Hulbert. He has been recognized by the National Foundation for Advancements in the Arts for excellence in teaching and his students are top prizewinners of national and international competitions including the Lev Vlassenko Piano Competition, Kosciuszko Foundation Chopin Piano Competition, Music Teacher's National Association Piano Competition, New York International Piano Competition, Hilton Head, Cleveland International Piano Competition for Young Artists, Nina Wideman, International Russian Music, King Award, Missouri Southern, Corpus Christi, Lennox Young Artists, Bösendorfer and Yamaha

USASU, Heida Hermanns, International E-Piano Competitions, and Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition.

Nagai frequently gives master classes throughout the United States and Asia including recent classes at Shanghai Conservatory, Beijing's Central Conservatory, Xinghai Conservatory, Shenzhen Arts School in China, Seoul National University, Seoul Arts School, in Korea, Hong Kong Academy for the Performing Arts, National Taiwan Normal University, Oberlin Conservatory, Eastman School of Music, and Northwestern University. He also regularly serves as adjudicator of international piano competitions and has served on the juries of the Gina Bachauer International Piano Competitions, World Piano Competition, and Alaska International Piano E-Competition, amongst others.

Currently Professor of Piano and Chair of the Piano Department at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, Nagai teaches during the summers at the Amalfi Coast Music Festival in Italy, and "Art of Piano" at Cincinnati Conservatory. He has also been summer faculty at the Shanghai and Beijing International Piano Festivals in China, Eastern Music Festival in North Carolina, Chautauqua, Summit Festivals in New York, Pianofest in the Hamptons, South Eastern Piano Festival in South Carolina, Colburn Academy, and Montecito International Music Festival in California. Nagai is a former faculty member at the Interlochen Arts Academy.

ROBERTA RUST has concertized to critical acclaim around the globe, with performances at such venues as Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall, New York's Merkin Concert Hall, Rio de Janeiro's Sala Cecilia Meireles, Washington's Corcoran Gallery, and Seoul's KNUA Hall. Hailed for her recordings on the Centaur and Protone labels, Rust has appeared with the Lark, Ying, and Amernet String Quartets and at Miami's Mainly Mozart Festival, the Philippines Opusfest, the Palm Beach Chamber Music Festival, Festival Miami, Long Island's Beethoven Festival, and France's La Gesse. She has given master classes throughout Asia and the Americas and at the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival, the University of Florida International

Piano Festival, and the Fondation Bell'Arte International Certificate for Piano Artists program. Rust has served as a competition adjudicator for the New World Symphony, the Chautauqua and Brevard Festivals, and the Colburn School's Music Academy. She studied at the Peabody Conservatory, graduated summa cum laude from the University of Texas at Austin, and earned performer's certificates in piano and German Lieder from the Mozarteum in Salzburg. A student of Ivan Davis, Arthur Balsam, John Perry, and Phillip Evans, she received a master's degree from the Manhattan School of Music and a doctorate from the University of Miami. OMRI SHIMRON is a pianist and educator based in Oakland, CA. He is an Assistant Professor and Coordinator of Piano at California State University, East Bay (Hayward), where he teaches an international group of students. His solo album, featuring Frederic Rzewski's 36 Variations on "The People United Will Never Be Defeated!" was released in July 2014 on New Focus Records. Earlier this summer, he presented a lecture about Rzewski's work in the Performing Indeterminacy conference at the University of Leeds (UK). In 2016 he performed a recital at the World Piano Conference in Novi Sad, Serbia. Since the summer of 2013, he has served on the faculty of the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival at the University of South Florida in Tampa.

Shimron recently performed recitals and lecture-recitals at Las Positas College, Modesto Junior College, Gettysburg College, Fort Lewis College, Eastern Carolina University, the North Carolina Music Academy, Elon University, and the Portland Piano Company. Together with his 2-piano/8-hand colleagues, he has also given collaborative recitals at St. Petersburg College, Peace Church in Clearwater, FL, and the Rochester Institute of Technology.

Born in the United States but raised in Israel, Shimron appeared at the Jerusalem Music Center, Jerusalem Academy of Music, and Tel Aviv Museum. In the U.S., he won prizes from the Hoffman Competition and the Chautauqua Institution. As an orchestral soloist, Shimron played with the Hillsdale College Orchestra, the Finger Lakes Symphony, and the Elon University Orchestra. Collaborative and solo concerts also included appearances at the Kennedy Center's Millennium Stage, and live radio broadcasts for WBFO, WXXI, and WUSF stations.

Outside the U.S., Shimron has participated in the Felicia Blumental Festival (Tel Aviv), the American Conservatory in Fontainebleau (France), and has presented recitals at Wolfson College (Oxford) and the Bursa State Conservatory (Turkey). In 2008, he performed 'anisotropie', a work for prepared piano by Michael Quell, at SoundsCAPE—a contemporary music festival in Italy.

An eclectic performer, Shimron's repertoire choices are traditional yet increasingly contemporary. In the past decade he premiered several new works by young composers such as Hackbarth's *Lines of Communication* and Dietz's *Five Reflections on the Rubáiyát of Omar Khayyam*. Other projects included recording David Lipten's trio *Whorl*, and performances of George Crumb's *Eine Kleine Mitternachtmusik* (2002).

In his teaching, Shimron embraces a whole-body approach to music that integrates expression, analysis, and physical awareness with a historically informed approach to style and sound. He has presented numerous lecture-recitals for the College Music Society and served as President-Elect of its Mid-Atlantic Chapter in 2015.

Before relocating to the San Francisco Bay Area, Shimron taught at Elon University, Hillsdale College (MI), and Eastern Mediterranean University on the island of Cyprus. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts, (piano), a Master of Music (piano), and a Master of Arts (music theory pedagogy) from the Eastman School of Music, University of Rochester, where he studied with Rebecca Penneys.

Consistently acclaimed for his exquisite tonal beauty and superb artistry, **BORIS SLUTSKY** emerged on the international music scene when he captured the First Prize—along with every major prize, including the Audience Prize and Wilhelm Backhaus Award—at the 1981 William Kapell International (University of Maryland) Piano Competition. His other accomplishments include first prizes at the Kosciuszko Chopin Competition and San Antonio International Keyboard Competition, and major prizes at the International Bach Competition in Memory of Glenn Gould, Busoni, Rina Sala Gallo, and Ettore Pozzoli International Piano Competitions.

Since his orchestral debut at Carnegie Hall with the New York Youth Symphony in 1980, Mr. Slutsky has appeared on nearly every continent as soloist and recitalist, collaborating with such eminent conductors as Dimitri Kitaenko and Valery Gergiev. He has performed with the London Philharmonic, Stuttgart State Orchestra and Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Neuss am Rhein in Germany, Bem Symphony Orchestra in Switzerland, Bergen Philharmonic in Norway, RAI Orchestra in Milan, KBS Symphony Orchestra in Korea, and major orchestras in Spain, Russia, Columbia, and Brazil. In South Africa, he has been soloist with the orchestras of Cape Town, Durban, and Johannesburg. His North American engagements have included concerts with the Baltimore, Florida, Utah, and Toronto Symphonies.

Mr. Slutsky has been heard on recital series throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, Latin America, and the Far East, making appearances at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, the Kaufmann Concert Hall, Bunka Kaikan in Tokyo, National Concert Hall in Taipei, Performing Arts Center in Seoul, and

Teatro Colon in Bogota, among many others. An avid chamber musician, Mr. Slutsky's more than two decades of chamber music collaborations include the critically acclaimed recording of Schumann's Sonatas for Violin and Piano with Ilya Kaler on the Naxos label, as well as performances with many renowned artists. He has also presented master classes throughout North America, Europe, and Asia, and served as a jury member for many international piano competitions.

Born in Moscow into a family of musicians, Mr. Slutsky received his early training at Moscow's Gnessin School for Gifted Children as a student of Anna Kantor, and completed his formal studies at the Juilliard School and Manhattan School of Music, studying with Nadia Reisenberg, Nina Svetlanova, John Browning, and Joseph Seiger. In addition, he has worked for many years with his mentor Alexander Eydleman. BARRY SNYDER is an internationally acclaimed pianist and teacher, whose entry onto the international stage came after winning three major prizes at the 1966 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition: Silver Medal, Pan American Union Award, and the Chamber Music Prize.

Since then, Snyder has toured the world performing concerti, presenting solo and collaborative recitals, and leading master classes. Snyder has performed with conductors such as Robert Shaw, Leopold Stokowski, David Zinman, Charles Dutoit, Sixten Ehrling, and Arthur Fiedler. As a juror, Snyder has chaired the jury for the World International Piano Competition in Cincinnati and was a member of the jury for the Glasgow Young Artists Competition.

Snyder is committed to performing 20th and 21st century repertoire, and has given world premieres of works by such composers as Syndey Hodkinson, Toshio Hosakawa and Augusta Read Thomas. Many compositions, such as those by Carter Pann and Verne Reynolds, have been written specifically for him.

Barry Snyder studied solo piano with renowned teachers Wilbur Hollman,

Vladimir Sokoloff, and Cecile Genhart, and studied chamber music with John Celentano and Brooks Smith.

Born in Bogotá, Colombia, **BLANCA URIBE** graduated *magna cum laude* from the Academy of Music and Dramatic Art in Vienna as a student of the remarkable Richard Hauser, and from The Juilliard School in New York, where she did her postgraduate studies with Martin Canin and Rosina Lhévinne. Her extensive repertoire ranges from Scarlatti to works of the present. Particularly notable are her interpretations of the complete Iberia Suite of Isaac Albéniz, which she has recorded, and the 32 Sonatas of Beethoven, which she has performed on several occasions in South America and at Vassar College (New York), where she held the George Sherman Dickinson Professorship.

Ms. Uribe enjoys a busy career as recitalist and soloist in Europe, South America, and the U.S.A., appearing with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Philharmonia of London, the American Symphony, the Residentie Orkest in The Hague, Orquesta Sinfónica del Estado de México, and all the principal Orchestras in Colombia, among many others.

Ms. Uribe's many recordings include the critically acclaimed Danzas Fantásticas by Joaquín Turina; Richard Wilson's Concerto for Piano and Orchestra with the Pro-Arte Chamber Orchestra of Boston, conducted by Leon Botstein; Piano Duos with Harold Martina; Beethoven Sonatas Opp. 101, 106 "Hammerklavier", 109, 110 and 111; and two CDs with works by Colombian composers Emilio Murillo and Antonio María Valencia. Her many honors include the Order of Saint Charles, which she received in 1986 from the President of Colombia and an Honorary Doctorate from the Valle University in Colombia. In 2007 the Fundación Albéniz presented her in Camprodón (Spain), birthplace of the composer, with the Isaac Albéniz Medal for her interpretations and recording of the Iberia Suite.

She has given numerous master classes in Colombia, Venezuela, Canada, the U.S., Puerto Rico, South Korea, and Spain and has served on the juries of a number of international competitions, including the Gina Bachauer, the William Kapell, the Cleveland International, and the Van Cliburn in the U.S.; the Esther Honens in Canada; the Paloma O'Shea Santander International Piano Competition and the Jaén International in Spain; the Beethoven in Vienna, Austria; the Axa in Dublin, Ireland; and the Busoni in Italy. Ms. Uribe is now on the Faculty at Eafit University in Medellín, Colombia.

Young American pianist, **BENJAMIN WARSAW** (benjaminwarsaw.com) actively pursues a career as a classical pianist, composer, teacher, and accompanist. He has

performed numerous solo and ensemble concerts throughout North America. His performances have received enthusiastic reviews from Clavier Magazine, ABC News, Canadian Press, Fox News, and Minneapolis StarTribune. A native of Atlanta, Georgia, Benjamin gave his New York City debut in May 2007 at Victor Borge Hall. Recent concert highlights include, Schwartz Center, Emory University, Atlanta, GA; Yamaha Hall and Haydn Birthplace, Vienna, Austria; O'Shaughnessy Theatre, Minneapolis, MN; and JFK Birthplace, Boston, MA. TABITHA COLUMBARE enjoys a budding career as a pianist, pedagogue, and administrator. She studied with Dr. Richard Shuster as an undergraduate at Texas Woman's University in Denton, Texas and was recognized with the TWU

Tabitha currently lives with her husband (a trumpet player in the U.S. Army) on Fort Bliss in El Paso, TX. There, she maintains a small private studio, teaches piano at the Desert Moon Academy of the Arts, and is an active member of the El Paso Music Teachers Association. In addition to performing and teaching, Tabitha delights in assisting musicians as a student life administrator. She was a head counselor and coordinator for the Chautauqua Institution Music Festival in 2012. Now, she returns to RPPF as part-time faculty and for her fifth year as the Assistant Director.

Korean pianist YUEUN KIM is a winner of numerous competitions including the Sejong Music Competition and the Bach Stravinsky Awards. She has performed at the Chautauqua Music Festival, the Castleman Quartet Program, and the Korean American Day Celebration. E-NA SONG, from South Korea, earned a Bachelor of Music degree in 2012, studying with Hyung-Bae Kim at Seoul National University. She held a scholarship

there and graduated with honors. She earned her Master of Music degree in Piano Performance from the Eastman School of Music in 2014 and is currently finishing the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Piano Performance and Literature there where she studied with Professor Rebecca Penneys. Since 2015, she has worked as a Teaching Assistant for the studio of Rebecca Penneys. As a soloist, she made her New York debut in Weill Hall, Carnegie Hall as a winner of the American Protégé International Piano Competition in New York City in 2016. JeeHae Ahn began her piano studies at age three and performed in public two years later. She performed in major concert venues and music festivals throughout her native country where she was a top prize-winner in numerous competitions, including the Junior Chopin Competition, Busan Music Festival Competition, and EumYoun Competition, and she was the youngest pianist to perform in the Fourth Chopin International Competition in Moscow. In 2008, her first year in the United States, JeeHae won the Boston Symphony Orchestra Youth Concerts Concerto Competition. As a result, she appeared as a featured soloist with the Boston Symphony Orchestra in the following spring. She appeared on NPR's program From the Top and was awarded the Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award. She also won the Harvard Musical Association Competition, for which she gave a recital in 2011. Most recently, she won the Eastman School of Music Piano Department's concerto competition, playing Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No. 1 with the Eastman Philharmonia and Eastman School Symphony Orchestra. Subsequently, she graduated from the New England Conservatory of Music where she received a full scholarship studying with Wha Kyung Byun, Russell Sherman, and Meng-Chieh Liu. She finished her first year of the doctorate program at the Eastman School of Music with Rebecca Penneys and will continue her degree with Douglas Humpherys.

Rolando Antonio Alejandro was born in San Juan, Puerto Rico in 1999 and began lessons when he was eight at the Conservatory of Music of Puerto Rico. In 2012 and 2014 he participated in a concert for talented young artists sponsored by the Musical Foundation of Ponce and the Jean O. Petty Foundation. In 2013 he was invited by Maestro Luis "Perico" Ortiz to participate in the production 'Tiempo de Amar' and recorded a "danza" called "Amor Eterno" by Luciano Quiñones. Rolando appeared with the Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra in 2013 and 2014, performing Mendelssohn's Piano Concertos Nos. 1 and 2. Ottawa-native pianist **Vivian Chen**, age 20, is currently in her third year at the University of Toronto majoring in piano performance under the tutelage of Lydia Wong. Canadian Music Competition with 95%, and at the University of Toronto's UTSO Concerto Competition, resulting in a performance with the orchestra this past January. She has performed at venues in and around Ottawa and Toronto, most recently performing in the Weill Recital Hall in March as her Carnegie Hall debut and at the Ambassador's Residence of the Canadian Embassy this May in Beijing. Chelsea de Souza is a Steinway Young Artist from Mumbai, India. A musician with extensive performing experience, she has won four All-India piano competitions, the 2010 IIYM international piano competition, and the 2013 Tuesday Musical Scholarship Organization competition. De Souza has been interviewed on NBC TV and performed live on Kansas Public Radio. In addition to numerous appearances in the US, Belgium, and Germany, de Souza has given performances across India, with the Bombay Chamber Orchestra as well as in personal concert tours as a soloist and in joint voice and piano recitals with her sister Chloe. She has won numerous competitions, including first prize at the Con Brio All-India piano competition in 2012. She was also a winner at the 2013 Musiquest All-India piano competition. Upcoming engagements include solo recitals in some of the most important halls and cultural centers in Spain, Poland, Germany, Austria, and Canada. Most recently, Yang was awarded the 2017 Steinway and Sons Piano Award, the top distinction given to an outstanding graduating pianist at Mannes School of Music (funded by Steinway). Yang has also received many prizes from competitions including the 5th Metropolitan International Piano Competition, the International Heida Hermanns Piano Competition, Thaviu Issac Piano Competition, Los Angeles International Liszt Competition, San Francisco Chopin Competition, and Evanston Music Club Competition. Yang is a graduate of the Mannes School of Music (M.M. 2017), as a student of Pavlina Dokovska, and Northwestern University (B.A./B.M. 2015), where he graduated with degrees in Economics and Piano Performance. His most important musical influence and close mentor is William Wellborn, with whom he studied at the San Francisco Conservatory Preparatory Division. Important teachers include Julian Dawson, Audrey Axinn, and Dang Thai Son. This fall, Yang continues his studies at Mannes School of Music in the Professional Studies Diploma Program, funded by the Mannes

President Scholarship Award and the Peter Gross Fund. A competitive athlete, Yang was on the Northwestern Boxing Team and currently trains Muay Thai under Kru Nestor Marte, a leading MMA coach who trains current professional UFC fighters. He is also a violinist, composer, singer, guitarist, and producer.

Jiawei (Jerry) Yuan was born in Datong, China and is twenty-four years old. He began his piano lessons at the age of five and went on to study at the Shenzhen Arts School, Central Conservatory of Music piano academy at Gulangyu, Oberlin Conservatory of Music, and University of Houston. He successfully earned both a Performing Artist Certificate and a Bachelor of Music under the tutelage of Andrew Parr at Stephen F. Austin State University. Jiawei's previous private piano lesson teachers include Nancy Weems, Alvin Chow, Ming Yang, Chengzong Yin, Mingyi Wu, and Meng Bian. His masterclass teachers include Jean-Bernard Pommier, Robert McDonald, Yoheved Kaplinsky, John Owings, Marc Silverman, Douglas Humpherys, Nelita True, David Korevaar, Lee Kum Sing, and Ning An. He started broadening his musical perspectives by participating in the Interharmony International Music Festival in Italy and earning awards from the 14th Hong Kong Open Piano Competition, 9th Russian International Music Piano Competition, Ruth Burr Piano Competition, and 64th Wideman International Piano Competition. As a soloist, he has performed in the Hongtai Concert Hall in Xiamen, China; Beijing Concert Hall; Severence Hall in Cleveland; Dudley Recital Hall and Moores Opera House in University of Houston; Cole Concert Hall in Stephen F. Austin State University; and Recital Hall in Arcidosso, Italy. As a chamber musician, he has performed duo, trio, and quintet music in the Moores Opera House in addition to a trio performance in the Recital Hall in Arcidosso, Italy. Besides playing the piano, Jiawei attends symphony concerts, operas, and other vocal or instrumental recitals. He also likes to ride his bike, swim, go bowling, play soccer, table tennis, billiard, or badminton, and watch movies and dramas. He enjoys life just as he enjoys playing the piano.

Han Zhangziyi was born in Taiyuan, Shanxi province, China and is currently nineteen years old. Han first began playing the piano in 2002 at the age of four. She became a student of Professor Da-chun You in 2009 at the Dongfangxingzhi Piano School of Shanghai and later studied under Professor Yun-lin Yang. Currently, she is a sophomore studying at the Shanghai Conservatory of Music under Professor Cheung-yu Mo. Han is a recipient of many scholarships. She won the "XiuZhi Deng Scholarship" four times in 2010 and 2013. In addition, she was awarded the "People's Scholarship" and "Lilly New Scholarship" in 2016. She was also the 1st prize winner of the "Chinese Outstanding Students' Piano Contest" in 2010 in Shanghai. Han has performed Saint-Saëns' *Carnival of the Animals* with the Shanxi Symphony Orchestra. She also performed in the "Parsons 30th Anniversary China Tour" during the summer of 2016, where she played in multiple-piano ensembles in the National Grand Theater, Shanghai Grand Theater, Suzhou Grand Theater, and Guangzhou Concert Hall, among others.

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
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
