REBECCA PENNEYS is a recitalist, chamber musician, orchestral soloist, educator, and adjudicator. For over six decades she has been hailed as a pianist of prodigious talent. Rebecca has concertized throughout all the continents north of Antarctica. A Steinway Artist, she is also a popular guest artist, keynote speaker, and celebrated teacher. She represented the United States in United States Information Service State Department Cultural tours over a ten-year period. Her current and former students include prizewinners in international competitions and hold important teaching posts on every continent. In 2017, finishing her 37th year, Rebecca became Professor Emerita of Piano at the Eastman School of Music. She was Chair of Chautauqua Piano for 34 years before launching her own festival, the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival, in 2013. RPPF is tuition-free at USF Tampa and supported by Rebecca Penneys Friends of Piano, Inc. (non-profit 501c3). Currently, she is Artist-in-Residence at St. Petersburg College (2001-present) and holds a courtesy Steinway-Artist-in-Residence

position at the University of South Florida (2015-present). Rebecca is also director of the St. Petersburg College Piano Series in Florida (2007-present), pianist of the Salon Chamber Music Series at the Rochester Academy of Medicine (1997-present), and founder-director of the Eastman Piano Series at the Summit (2009-present). Prior academic positions were at Milwaukee Conservatory of Music (1974-1980) and North Carolina School of the Arts (1972-1974). She was inducted into the Steinway Teachers Hall of Fame in 2021. Rebecca's teachers include Aube Tzerko, Leonard Stein, Rosina Lhevinne, Artur Rubinstein, Menahem Pressler, György Sebök, Janos Starker, Josef Gingold, and Iannis Xenakis. During 2020 she completed a virtual book, *Chicken Soup for Pianists*, available on Kindle and Books. She has three DVDs for Naxos and more than a dozen CD's on Fleur De Son Classics and Centaur Records, all available on Amazon. Learn more at rebeccapenneys.com

Faculty & Staff Biographies



The recipient of an Avery Fisher Career Grant and the Andrew Wolf Chamber Music Prize, Philadelphia-born LYDIA ARTYMIW has performed with orchestras world-wide including the Boston Symphony, Cleveland Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, Philadelphia Orchestra, Minnesota Orchestra, San Francisco Symphony, Seattle Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony, Detroit Symphony, LA Philharmonic, Cincinnati Symphony, St. Luke's Chamber Orchestra, and St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. Solo tours have taken her to major American cities, important European music centers, and throughout the Far East. Artymiw has recorded for the Bridge, Centaur, Chandos, and Naxos labels. Her "Variations" CD (Chandos) won Gramophone Magazine's "Best of the Year" award, and "The Complete Cello-Piano Works of Felix Mendelssohn" with Marcy Rosen (Bridge) was nominated for a 2018 Grammy award. Festival appearances include Aspen, Badenweiler (Germany), Bantry (Ireland), Bay Chamber, Bravo! Vail Valley, Caramoor, Chamber Music Northwest, SaltBay, Chautauqua, Grand Canyon, Hollywood Bowl, Marlboro, Montréal, Mostly Mozart, Seattle, and Tucson. Artymiw has collaborated with Yo-Yo Ma. Richard Stoltzman, Arnold Steinhardt, Michael Tree, Kim Kashkashian, John Aler, Benita Valente, and the Guarneri, Tokyo, American, Alexander, Borromeo, Daedalus, Miami, Orion, and Shanghai Quartets, and has toured nationally with Music from Marlboro groups. A recipient of top prizes in the 1976 Leventritt and the 1978 Leeds International Competitions, she graduated from Philadelphia's University of the Arts and studied with concert pianist and former Director of the Curtis Institute of Music, Gary Graffman, for twelve years. Artymiw served on juries for the 2022 Charles Wadsworth Piano Competition, 2019 First China International Music Competition, 2017 Lang Lang Shenzhen/Futian International Piano Competition and 2015 Van Cliburn Junior International Piano Competition and Festival. Since 2015 Artymiw has also been a frequent guest teacher at Juilliard. From 1989-2020 Artymiw was Distinguished McKnight Professor of Piano at the University of Minnesota and now holds an Emerita title. Visit lydiaartymiw.com

specializes in integrating music and movement into the curriculum. Her unique, multifaceted approach evokes deep listening and playful experimentation. Students work together to understand the components of rhythm and sound, develop attention, improve coordination, and challenge the mind. Her collaborations have spanned the United States, Canada, France, Switzerland, Thailand, and Venezuela. In 1998, Terry earned a M.A. in Ethnomusicology from Kent State University and has been listed in "Who's Who" since 2000. Recent articles include "Dalcroze Eurhythmics and the Quick Reaction Exercises" published in the Orff Echo, and "Encouraging Collaboration" published in the Dalcroze Society of America Connections. Terry frequently presents at national conferences, is a teaching artist with the Kennedy Center's Ohio State-Based Collaboratives, the Ohio Arts Council's Teach Arts Ohio roster, and is an artist for Creative Aging Ohio. She sings with the Cleveland Orchestra Blossom Festival Chorus and Choral Arts Society. Her solo piano program "Classical Expressions of the Folk Tradition" has been received with great acclaim. Terry teaches Vocal Music of Russia and the former USSR at Case Western Reserve University. KATHRYN BROWN has performed around the globe as concerto soloist, recitalist, and chamber musician. She gave her New York Recital Debut at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, and has appeared in concert at New York's 92nd Street Y. She was featured on the Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concert Series in Chicago, Cleveland's Severance Hall and the German Embassy, the Philips Collection, and the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. International highlights include concerts at Prague's Rudolfinum Hall, the University of London, and the National Theatre in Ghana, Africa. A recipient of the Louis Sudler Prize for the Arts, Brown is an advocate of contemporary music, recording and premiering works by Menotti, Fitch, Tcimpidis, Brouwer, Hersch, and Pinscher. Pianist and co-founder of the Myriad Chamber Players, her chamber music credits include performances at the Marlboro Music Festival with members of the Guarneri String Quartet and Beaux Arts Trio. She has also performed with the Cavani String Quartet, members of the Lincoln Center Chamber Players, and The Verdehr Trio, and was featured with Dmitri Ashkenazy on Ravinia's Rising Stars series. She has been featured on the British Broadcasting Network, the PBS Artistry of... series, Chicago's WFMT Radio, and NPR's Performance Today. Her discography includes releases with Telarc, New World, Albany, and Crystal labels. An accomplished singer and recitalist, Brown's many performances include premieres at Severance Hall with the Cleveland Orchestra and feature roles at the Aspen Music Festival and Tanglewood Music Center. She is an enthusiastic pedagogue and a frequent juror of competitions, nationally and internationally. She currently serves as

ALAN CHOW has performed in recital and in concert with orchestra in nearly all fifty states, throughout Asia, and in Europe. He has been presented at New York's Lincoln Center and Merkin Hall, Chicago's Symphony Center and Ravinia, the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. and Vienna's MozartHaus. He has also appeared as soloist with the National, Pan Asian, Utah, Oakland, Kansas City, and Omaha Symphonies and the Hong Kong, Shanghai, and Tulsa Philharmonics. Competition honors include First Prizes at the Concert Artists Guild International Competition, UCLA International Piano Competition, and Palm Beach Invitational International Piano Competition, in addition to the Silver Medal and Audience Favorite Prize at the Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition. He has collaborated with the American, Pacifica, Miami and Escher String Quartets and has been a guest artist at numerous festivals. In addition, he appears in recital in the Cheng-Chow Trio with pianists Angela Cheng and his twin brother Alvin Chow. He has given masterclasses throughout North America, Europe and Asia at conservatories, universities, and summer festivals and is an active juror for piano competitions in the US, China, and Singapore. Chow has served as guest professor at the Central Conservatory in Beijing, honored visiting professor at the Shenyang Conservatory, and Visiting Associate Professor at Oberlin Conservatory. He has also presented masterclasses for the conservatories in Shanghai, Chengdu, Wuhan and Xian. Chow graduated Co-Valedictorian (with his brother) at the University of Maryland, where he studied with Nelita True. At the Juilliard School, he studied with Sasha Gorodnitzki and at Indiana University, he was a student of Menahem Pressler. Formerly on the artist faculty at Northwestern University's Bienen School of Music, Chow currently teaches and is Chair of the Piano Department at the Eastman School of Music. ALVIN CHOW has appeared throughout North America and in Asia as orchestral soloist and recitalist. In addition, he has performed extensively in duo-piano recitals with his wife, Angela Cheng, and his twin brother, Alan. He graduated summa cum laude and Co-Valedictorian (with his brother) at the University of Maryland, as a student of Nelita True. Chow received the Victor Herbert Prize in Piano upon graduation from the Juilliard School, where he studied with

Sascha Gorodnitzki, and held the Joseph Battista Memorial Scholarship at Indiana University as a student of Menahem Pressler. He has concertized in Hong Kong, Shanghai, Wuhan, Vienna, Montreal, New York, and Los Angeles, and appeared as soloist with the National Symphony Orchestra, Shanghai Philharmonic, and the Mozarteum Orchestra in Salzburg. He has also been Convention Artist for state MTNA conferences in California, Colorado, Florida, Hawaii, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, New Jersey, Ohio, and Tennessee. Chow has presented masterclasses and lectures throughout the U.S. and abroad, including the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, Colburn School in Los Angeles, and Indiana University. He has been invited to perform and teach at numerous summer festivals, including the Shanghai Piano Festival, Banff Piano Master Classes, North Coast Piano Festival, Southeastern Piano Festival, New Orleans International Piano Festival, Lake Como Summer Piano School in Italy, Classical Music Festival in Austria, Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival, and University of Florida International Piano Festival. Chow has been a member of the faculty at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music since 1999. He served as Chair of the Piano Department from 2007-19, Director of the Division of Keyboard Studies from 2019-21, and was the Ruth Strickland Gardner Professor of Music from 2011-14. JAMES DOUTHIT (Eastman, DMA Piano Performance and Literature '92) is the Dean of the Mariam Cannon Hayes School of Music at Appalachian State University. His early efforts in the Hayes School of Music have resulted in a significant increase in development focused on student awards and scholarships, an acoustic improvement to Rosen Concert Hall, and increased enrollment. Focused on "transforming a passion for music to a profession for life", Douthit organized a Career Development Boot Camp, a three-day residency with Dr. Angela Myles Beeching, which gave the students, faculty, and staff the opportunity to explore their own career narratives. Douthit holds a Doctor of Musical Arts in Piano Performance from the Eastman School of Music, a Master's Degree in Piano Performance with an emphasis in accompanying and chamber music from Northwestern University and a Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance (summa cum laude) from Mars Hill College in Western North Carolina. He has also studied higher education leadership at the Institute for Educational Management at the Harvard University Graduate School of Education. Ukrainian-born American pianist INNA FALIKS is renowned for her commanding performances of standard piano repertoire, as well as genre-bending inter-disciplinary projects, and inquisitive work with contemporary composers. She has appeared around the world in recital and with major orchestras, performing with conductors Leonard Slatkin, Keith Lockhart and many others. Recent seasons include performances at Ravinia Festival in Chicago, National Gallery in Washington DC, Chigiana Academy in Italy, as soloist with US orchestras nation-wide, and repeated tours of all the major venues in China. Faliks collaborates with and premieres music by some of today's most significant composers, including Billy Childs, Richard Danielpour, Timo Andres, and Clarice Assad. She founded the awardwinning poetry-music series Music/Words in 2008, with performances in New York, Chicago, and Los Angeles, both on stage and on WFMT radio. She regularly tours her monologue-recital *Polonaise-Fantasie*, the Story of a Pianist, which tells the story of her immigration with music by Bach, Chopin, Gershwin, and Carter (recorded on Delos). Faliks' discography includes Reimagine: Beethoven & Ravel (Navona, 2021), for which she commissioned nine composers to respond to Beethoven's Bagatelles Op. 126 and Ravel's Gaspard de la Nuit. Also released in 2021 (MSR Classics) is The Schumann Project, Volume 1, which includes Clara Schumann's G minor sonata and Robert Schumann's Symphonic Etudes Op. 13. Other releases include all-Beethoven and Rachmaninoff/Ravel/Pasternak discs for MSR Classics, and The Master and Margarita project, featuring three world premieres on Sono Luminus (2022). Faliks is professor and head of Piano Studies at UCLA, and in demand world-wide as a masterclass artist and adjudicator. She has articles and essays appearing in Los Angeles Times and The Washington Post. A musical memoir, titled Weight in the Fingertips, will be published in 2023 by Globe Pequot. Composer **KENNETH FRAZELLE**'s music has been commissioned and performed by numerous prominent artists, including Yo-Yo Ma, Jeffrey Kahane, Dawn Upshaw, Anthony Dean Griffey, Emmanuel Ax, the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, Ransom Wilson, Paula Robison, John Adams, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, Jan DeGaetani and Gilbert Kalish. He has received commissions from Music@Menlo, the Ravinia Festival, and the Spoleto Festival. Frazelle first received international acclaim with his score for *Still/Here*, a multimedia dance theater work for the Bill T.Jones/Arnie Zane Dance

Co. Frazelle has received awards and fellowships from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, the American Academy in Rome, and Columbia University, and he was the winner of the 2001 Barlow Prize, the international competition administered through Brigham Young University. He has held residencies with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, the Santa Rosa Symphony and the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum. Frazelle was a pupil of Roger Sessions at The Juilliard School and attended high school at the North Carolina School of the Arts, where he studied with Robert Ward. RAY GOTTLIEB, O.D., Ph.D. practiced behavioral optometry for many years working with patients to improve visual, movement, learning and athletic skills. He has worked with Rebecca Penneys on the piano faculty of the Chautauqua Institution (1992-2012) and at RPPF since 2013, where he applies his stress-point learning approach to teach advanced piano students ways to improve their attention, memory, body coordination, and learning skills. He eliminated his myopia using Bates natural eye improvement practices and prevented the onset of his presbyopia using an approach he invented. His writings include Attention and Memory Training: Stress-Point Learning on the Trampoline and The Fundamentals of Flow in Learning Music (with Rebecca Penneys). Now retired from active optometric practice, Dr. Gottlieb lectures about his optometric training approach to educators, health professionals, and the general public in the U.S. and abroad. He lives in Florida where he researches, writes, swims, invents, and practices eye/brain/body exercises on a sunny Gulf of Mexico beach. Learn more at raygottlieb.com



ARTHUR GREENE was born in New York City and received degrees from Yale, Juilliard, and Stony Brook. He studied with Martin Canin. Greene treasures the inheritance of our rich piano repertoire, which he considers among humanity's greatest achievements, and is grateful for the opportunity to bring it to life and share it with as many people as possible. He has performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the San Francisco, Utah, and National Symphonies, the Ukraine National Symphony, the Czech National Symphony, the Tokyo Symphony, and many others. He has performed recitals in Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, Moscow Rachmaninoff Hall, Tokyo Bunka Kaikan, Lisbon Sao Paulo Opera House, Hong Kong City Hall and concert houses in Shanghai, Beijing, Seoul, and throughout Japan. He was an Artistic

Ambassador to Serbia, Kosovo, and Bosnia for the United States Information Agency. Greene recorded the complete Etudes of Alexander Scriabin for Supraphon, and piano works of the Ukrainian composer Mykola Lysenko for Toccata Classics. He has made many recordings together with his wife, the violinist Solomia Soroka, for Naxos and Toccata. He has performed the 10 Sonata Cycle of Alexander Scriabin in many international venues, including multimedia presentations with Symbolist artworks. He has performed mazurkas with the Janusz Prusinowski Kompania, a Polish folk ensemble. He has been a faculty member of many summer festivals. including the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival, Perugia MusicFest, and Vivace Music Foundation. Greene is a member of the piano faculty of the University of Michigan. There he has won the Harold Haugh Award for Excellence in Studio Teaching. He and his students presented a recital series of the complete solo works of Chopin in nine concerts. His current and former students include prizewinners in international competitions, and his former students hold important teaching positions throughout the United States. Visit arthurgreene.com



CHRISTOPHER HARDING, Chair and Professor of Piano Performance at the University of Michigan, maintains an international career, presenting solo, concerto, and chamber music performances in venues as far-flung as the Kennedy Center and Phillips Collection in Washington, D.C., Suntory Hall in Tokyo, Seoul Art Center (IBK and Recital Halls), the National Theater Concert Hall in Taipei, as well as in Canada, mainland China, Israel, Italy, Russia, and Romania. His concerto performances have included concerts with the National Symphony and the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestras, San Angelo and Santa Barbara Symphonies, and the Tokyo City Philharmonic. festivals in China, the United States, and Europe. She is currently an undergraduate student at the Eastman School of Music, under the tutelage of Professor Douglas Humpherys.





His major prizes include the second prize at the Steinway Youth Piano Competition in China, among others. He has also participated in masterclasses with Ning An, Antonio Pompa-Baldi, Ewa Poblocka, Alexander Schimpf, Matti Raekallio, Edisher Savitski, Fabio Bidini, and Yury Shadrin. Most recently, he was accepted as one of 24 pianists to participate in the PianoTexas International Piano Festival.



Zhuoyue Zhang was born in China in 2002. She began studying piano performance at the age of six. She was admitted to the Music Middle School Affiliated to the Shanghai Conservatory of Music in 2012 and under the direction of Natalia Filippova from 2012 to 2021. In 2021, Zhuoyue was invited to the Eastman School of Music, studying under the guidance of Natalya Antonova. She has received multiple awards and scholarships over the years, including Gold Prize in the Youth Class at the 2020 Macao Piano Competition, First Prize at the International Young Pianists Competition, Third Prize at the Jikun Cai Youth Piano Competition, and Third Prize at the Seventh Shenzhen Piano Open Competition. She won the Third Prize both at RENMIN Scholarship and Shanghai Scholarship in successive years. Zhuoyue has also had the opportunity to study with top pianists and pedagogues from the Boston Conservatory, Royal Danish Academy of Music, and Royal Conservatorie of Scotland.

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
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
