It is pure joy to welcome you to RPPF 2024, the 12th season of the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival at the University of South Florida in Tampa. Our continued good fortune enables us to celebrate the healing power of global creative spirits and the incredible magic, beauty, and wisdom of music. Though the world remains troubled by profound turbulence and tragedy, we are steadfast in our faith in humanity and proud to continue our theme, Legacy of Piano and Planet.

Over 250 gifted collegiate pianists from 25 countries and 100 schools applied this season. The heart and soul of RPPF is our mission to help each aspiring pianist develop a unique artistic voice and shape a successful future. Every summer is an adventure as we alter the scope and depth of the festival and bring in fresh ideas while encouraging participants to personalize their experience according to individual needs. These exceptional young people, alongside our stellar multigenerational faculty, thrive during three weeks of piano immersion that feature intense private study, superb daily masterclasses, unparalleled legacy sessions, distinctive special topic classes, and thrilling performances.

Our "Dreamscape" programming has two aspects this summer. Arthur Murray dance instructors will teach a selection of dances that are part of the piano repertoire. My hope is that the sensation and wonder of dancing will spark new avenues of imagination and creativity. Dr. Kristin Kidgell, chiropractor and functional medicine professional, will offer group and private sessions on self-care for hands, arms, and the body in general. Feeling well means feeling free so that physical limitations do not restrict inventiveness or the execution of ideas. These offerings connect our participants to diverse, complementary modalities of knowledge and expression.

RPPF performance venues and opportunities unite our inspired musicians with enthusiastic audiences of all ages and backgrounds. Student Performance Class provides a platform for students to reach out to one another and taste the transition from student to teacher. Faculty offer Soirée Memories in an intimate setting that blends personal performance with snapshots of unique life journeys. The RPPF Satellite Concerts (formerly Ambassador Concerts) present RPPF students in venues throughout Tampa Bay, and now extend to other American cities as well. Our closing traditions are two USF events: the 2 Piano 8 Hands Extravaganza, a seriously silly event that explores what pianos and pianists do for fun, and the Student Showcase, a fabulous finale that highlights each of the 40 RPPF participants playing a short encore piece.

RPPF started on a whim, as a dream, and has grown into a renowned, much-loved, and well-established program that we hope will have an impact for generations to come. As our alumni continue to shine on the world stage, we hope that they, in turn, will nurture new generations of accomplished classical musicians. We enthusiastically support the Tampa Bay Community and embrace other charities as well. This year, RPPF has donated to the Adamant Music School in Vermont and Seaside Seabird Sanctuary here at home to sustain a rich quality of life and art for all. The RP USF Music Fund, established in 2021, provides for graduate music students at the University of South Florida.

FACULTY BIOGRAPHIES







Recipient of an Avery Fisher Grant and the Andrew Wolf Chamber Music Prize, Philadelphia-born LYDIA **ARTYMIW** has performed with over one hundred orchestras world-wide including the Boston Symphony, Cleveland Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, Philadelphia Orchestra, Minnesota Orchestra, and San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Seattle, St. Louis, National, Detroit, Los Angeles, Cincinnati, St. Luke's, and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. Solo recital tours have taken her to all major American cities and to European music centers, and throughout the Far East. Critics have acclaimed her seven solo recordings for Chandos, as well as for Bridge, Centaur, and Naxos. Her debut Chandos "Variations" CD won Gramophone's "Best of the Year" award. Her festival appearances include Aspen, Bay Chamber, Bravo! Vail, Caramoor, Chamber Music Northwest, Chautauqua, Grand Canyon, Hollywood Bowl, Marlboro, Montréal, Mostly Mozart, Seattle, and Tucson. Artymiw's Bridge CD of Mendelssohn's "Complete Cello and Piano Music" with cellist Marcy Rosen was nominated for a 2019 Grammy award. Artymiw has collaborated with such celebrated artists as Yo-Yo Ma, Arnold Steinhardt, Kim Kashkashian, Benita Valente, and the Guarneri, Tokyo, American, Borromeo, Daedalus, Miami, Orion, and Shanghai Quartets. A recipient of top prizes in the 1976 Leventritt and the 1978 Leeds International Competitions, she graduated from Philadelphia's University of the Arts and studied with Gary Graffman for twelve years. Artymiw has been a juror for international piano competitions including the 2015 Cliburn Junior, the 2017 Lang Lang-Fujian, the 2019 Beijing First China International, the 2022 Charles Wadsworth, the 2024 Montréal International, and the 2024 Gina Bachauer. She has also been a juror for 22 Juilliard concerto competitions and guest taught at Juilliard from 2015-2019. Artymiw is Emerita Distinguished McKnight Professor of Piano at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis where she taught from 1989-2020. KATHRYN BROWN has performed around the globe as concerto soloist, recitalist and chamber musician. She gave her New York Recital Debut at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, and has appeared at New York's 92nd Street Y. She has been featured on the Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concert Series in Chicago, Cleveland's Severance Hall, the German Embassy, the Philips Collection, the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., Prague's Rudolfinum Hall, the University of London, and the National Theatre in Ghana, Africa. Brown appeared on Columbia Artists' Community Concert Series and performed throughout Sweden, Africa, and Estonia as winner of the USIA Artistic Ambassadour Program. Recipient of the Darius Milhaud Prize and Louis Sudler Prize for the Arts, she is a powerful advocate of contemporary music and has recorded and premiered works by Menotti, Fitch, Tcimpidis, Brouwer, Hersch and Pinscher. Pianist and co-founder of the Myriad Chamber Players, Brown's chamber music credits include performances at the Marlboro Music Festival with members of the Guarneri String Quartet and Beaux Arts Trio. She has performed with the Cavani String Quartet, members of the Lincoln Center Chamber Players, and The Verdehr Trio. She was featured with Dmitri Ashkenazy on Ravinia's Rising Stars series and has collaborated with musicians from the world's leading orchestras. She has been featured on the British Broadcasting Network, the PBS Artistry of ... series, Chicago's WFMT Radio, and NPR's Performance Today. Her discography includes releases on the Telarc, New World, Albany, and Crystal labels. An accomplished singer and recitalist, Brown has performed premieres at Severance Hall with the Cleveland Orchestra and feature roles at the Aspen Music Festival and Tanglewood Music Center. She presents masterclasses, lectures, and is a frequent juror of competitions worldwide. Currently, she is Head of the Keyboard Division at The Cleveland Institute of Music.

Consistently praised for her brilliant technique, tonal beauty, and superb musicianship, Canadian pianist ANGELA **CHENG** is one of her country's national treasures. In addition to regular guest appearances with virtually every orchestra in Canada, she has performed with the symphonies of Saint Louis, Houston, Indianapolis, Colorado, Utah, San Diego and Jacksonville, as well as the philharmonic orchestras of Buffalo, Louisiana, London, Israel and Minas Gerais in Brazil. Recent performances include a debut with the Fort Worth Symphony, performing Rachmaninoff's "Variations on a Theme of Paganini," under the baton of Robert Spano, and a return to the Vancouver Symphony, performing Ravel's Concerto in G with Otto Tausk. Cheng has performed at Carnegie Hall, Kennedy Center/Washington, D.C., the 92nd Street Y/New York and Wigmore Hall in London. She appears regularly on recital series throughout the United States and Canada and has collaborated with numerous chamber ensembles including the Takács, Colorado, and Vogler quartets. North American festival performances include Banff, Chautauqua, Colorado, Great Lakes Chamber Music, Vancouver, Toronto and the Festival International de Lanaudière in Quebec. Cheng's recordings for CBC, include discs of Mozart and Shostakovich concerti and a CD of four Spanish concerti with Hans Graf and the Calgary Philharmonic. In addition, an all Chopin recital CD has been released by Universal Music Canada. Cheng has been Gold Medalist of the Arthur Rubinstein International Piano Masters Competition, as well as the first Canadian to win the prestigious Montreal International Piano Competition. Other awards include the Canada Council's coveted Career Development Grant and the Medal of Excellence for outstanding interpretations of Mozart from the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria. Angela Cheng studied extensively with Menahem Pressler at Indiana University and with Sascha Gorodnitzki at The Juilliard School. She is currently on the artist faculty of the Oberlin Conservatory of Music.



HIEYON CHOI is a distinguished South Korean pianist renowned for her achievements in prestigious competitions such as Kapell, Epinal, Busoni, and Viotti, She has performed with top orchestras worldwide, including das Rundfunkorchester Berlin, the National Symphony Orchestra, the Northern Sinfonia, the Seoul Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Korean Broadcast Symphony Orchestra. She is also a regular soloist in various festivals and concert series. A significant highlight of HieYon's career was her four-year cycle of all 32 Beethoven piano sonatas at the Kumho Art Hall in Seoul, earning her the Arts Award of the year 2005 by the Korean Arts & Cultural Association. She later completed a Beethoven chamber cycle and has explored series dedicated to Brahms, French music, and collaborated with renowned musicians like Truls Mørk and Tsuyoshi Tsutsumi. HieYon's repertoire extends beyond classical music to include 20th and 21st-century works. She was the inaugural Artist-in-Residence at the Tong-Yeong International Music Festival and has performed works by Olivier Messiaen, György Kurtag, and Sofia Gubaidulina, among others. She has also led contemporary music projects at Seoul National University, such as "Orient Express" and "TripleX," an international exchange production in response to the pandemic. Since joining the plano faculty at Seoul National University in 1999. HieYon has conducted numerous masterclasses worldwide and served as a jury member at international competitions. She has also released acclaimed albums, including her Beethoven and Debussy recordings. Born in Incheon, South Korea, HieYon began her musical journey at the age of 6 and studied under Prof. Joong-Won Koh before moving to Germany to study with Prof. Klaus Hellwig. She later drew inspiration from Prof. Hans Leygraf and Prof. György Sebök. In the fall of 2023, HieYon joined the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University piano faculty.



ALAN CHOW has performed in recitals and in concert with orchestras worldwide. He has been presented at New York's Lincoln Center and Merkin Hall, Chicago's Symphony Center and Ravinia, the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. and Vienna's MozartHaus. He has also appeared as soloist with the National, Pan Asian, Utah, Oakland, Kansas City, and Omaha Symphonies and the Hong Kong, Shanghai, and Tulsa Philharmonics. Competition honors include First Prizes at the Concert Artists Guild International Competition, UCLA International Piano Competition, and Palm Beach Invitational International Piano Competition, in addition to the Silver Medal and Audience Favorite Prize at the Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition. He has collaborated with the American, Pacifica, Miami and Escher String Quartets and has been a guest artist at numerous festivals. He also appears in recital in the Cheng-Chow Trio with pianists Angela Cheng and his twin brother Alvin Chow. He has given masterclasses throughout North America, Europe and Asia at conservatories, universities, and summer festivals and is a juror for piano competitions in the US, China, and Singapore. Chow has served as guest professor at Central Conservatory in Beijing, honored visiting professor at Shenyang Conservatory, and Visiting Associate Professor at Oberlin Conservatory. He has also presented masterclasses for the conservatories in Shanghai, Chengdu, Wuhan and Xian. Chow graduated Co-Valedictorian (with his brother) at the University of Maryland, studying with Nelita True. At the Juilliard School, he studied with Sasha Gorodnitzki and at Indiana University, with Menahem Pressler. Formerly on the faculty at Northwestern University's Bienen School of Music, Chow currently teaches and is Chair of the Piano Department at the Eastman School of Music. In 2023, he was appointed Professor of Piano at the Yehudi Menuhin School in Qingdao, China as a member of their Visiting Artist faculty. Visit esm.rochester.edu/directory/chow-alan



ALVIN CHOW has appeared throughout North America and Asia as orchestral soloist and recitalist. In addition, he has performed extensively in duo-piano recitals with his wife, Angela Cheng, and his twin brother, Alan. A native of Miami, Florida, he graduated summa cum laude and Co-Valedictorian (with his brother) at the University of Maryland, where he was a student of Nelita True. Mr. Chow received the Victor Herbert Prize in Piano upon graduation from the Juilliard School, where he studied with Sascha Gorodnitzki, and held the Joseph Battista Memorial Scholarship at Indiana University as a student of Menahem Pressler. Mr. Chow has been presented as recitalist in such cities as Hong Kong, Shanghai, Vienna, Montreal, Toronto, New York, and Los Angeles, and has appeared as soloist with the National Symphony Orchestra, Colorado Symphony, Alabama Symphony, Civic Orchestra of Chicago, Pan-Asia Symphony in Hong Kong, Shanghai Philharmonic, and the Mozarteum Orchestra in Salzburg, among others. Mr. Chow has presented numerous master classes and lectures at music institutions throughout the United States and abroad, including the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, Colburn School, Eastman School of Music, and Indiana University. He has taught and performed at numerous summer festivals, including the Shanghai Piano Festival, Banff Piano Master Classes, Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival, Southeastern Piano Festival, Adamant Music School, Classical Music Festival in Eisenstadt, Austria, and the Lake Como Summer Piano School in Italy. Formerly on the faculty at the University of Colorado-Boulder, Mr. Chow has been a member of the artist faculty at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music since 1999. He currently serves as Chair of the Piano Department. From 2011-14 he was the Ruth Strickland Gardner Professor of Music, and was awarded Oberlin's Excellence in Teaching Award in 2016. oberlin.edu/alvin-chow



JAMES GILES performs in important musical centers throughout America, Europe, and Asia. Recent tours include recitals in Toronto, Paris, Naples, Budapest, Manchester, England, and across Denmark. He collaborated with colleagues at the Tucson Chamber Music Festival, the Dempster Street Promusica, the American Liszt Society Festival, and was soloist with the Peoria Symphony. This season he plays Stravinsky with Northwestern's Symphonic Wind Ensemble; performs in Italy and Portugal; tours China; and travels to Yale, Lawrence University, New England Conservatory, University of Texas, University of Michigan, and Indiana University. He will serve on the jury of the 2024 Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition. A native of North Carolina, Dr. Giles studied with Byron Janis at Manhattan School of Music, Jerome Lowenthal at Juilliard, Nelita True at Eastman, and Robert Shannon at Oberlin. He received early career assistance from the Clarisse B. Kampel Foundation and was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to study in Italy with Lazar Berman. Dr. Giles is coordinator of the piano program and director of music performance graduate studies at Northwestern University's Bienen School of Music. He also directs the piano program at the Amalfi Coast Music Festival. He gives masterclasses and lectures at schools nationwide, including Juilliard, Manhattan, Eastman, Oberlin, Indiana, Yale, New England and has taught during the summers at the Gijon Piano Festival, Obidos Master Classes, Artcial Music Festival, Eastern Music Festival, Bowdoin, Brevard, Art of the Piano, Colburn, Interlochen, ARIA, Pianofest in the Hamptons, and the Schlern Festival in Italy. His classes internationally have occurred throughout China as well as at Seoul National University, Hanvang University (Seoul). Ewha Woman's University (Seoul), the Royal Danish Academy of Music (Copenhagen), the Sibelius Academy (Helsinki), the Chopin Academy (Warsaw), the Royal Northern College of Music (Manchester) and the Royal College of Music (London). music.northwestern.edu/faculty/profile/james-giles



RAY GOTTLIEB, O.D., Ph.D. originally from Los Angeles, is a graduate of UC California, UC Berkeley Optometry School, and Saybrook Institute. He practiced behavioral optometry for over six decades working with patients to improve visual, movement, learning and athletic skills. He worked with Rebecca Penneys at the Chautauqua Institution from 1992-2012, and since 2013, works at RPPF where he applies his stress-point learning approach to teach advanced piano students ways to improve their attention, memory, body coordination, and learning skills. He eliminated his own myopia using Bates natural eye improvement practices and prevented the onset of his presbyopia using an approach he invented. He is Dean of the College of Syntonic Optometry, or optometric phototherapy, a branch of ocular science dealing with the application of selected light frequencies through the eyes. Syntonics has been used clinically for over 80 years with continued success for strabismus (eye turns), amblyopia (lazy eye), focusing and convergence problems, learning disorders, and the after-effects of stress and trauma. Dr Ray's writings include *Attention and Memory Training: Stress-Point Learning on the Trampoline* and *The Fundamentals of Flow in Learning Music* (with Rebecca Penneys). Now retired from active optometric practice, Dr. Gottlieb lectures about his optometric training approach to educators, health professionals, and the general public in the U.S. and abroad. He lives in Florida where he researches, writes, swims, invents, and practices eye/brain/body exercises on a sunny Gulf of Mexico beach. Learn more at <u>raygottlieb.com</u>.



ARTHUR GREENE was born in New York City and received degrees from Yale, Juilliard, and Stony Brook. He studied with Martin Canin. Greene treasures the inheritance of our rich piano repertoire, which he considers among humanity's greatest achievements, and is grateful for the opportunity to bring it to life and share it with as many people as possible. He has performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the San Francisco, Utah, and National Symphonies, the Ukraine National Symphony, the Czech National Symphony, the Tokyo Symphony, and many others. He has played recitals in Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, Moscow Rachmaninov Hall, Tokyo Bunka Kaikan, Lisbon Sao Paulo Opera House, Hong Kong City Hall and concert houses in Shanghai, Beijing, Seoul, and throughout Japan. He was an Artistic Ambassador to Serbia, Kosovo, and Bosnia for the United States Information Agency. Greene recorded the complete Etudes of Alexander Scriabin for Supraphon, and piano works of the Ukrainian composer Mykola Lysenko for Toccata Classics. He has made many recordings together with his wife, the violinist Solomia Soroka, for Naxos and Toccata. He has performed the 10 Sonata Cycle of Alexander Scriabin in many international venues, including multi-media presentations with Symbolist artworks. He has performed mazurkas with the Janusz Prusinowski Kompania, a Polish folk ensemble. He has been a faculty member of many summer festivals, including the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival, Perugia MusicFest, and Vivace Music Foundation. Greene is a member of the piano faculty of the University of Michigan. There he won the Harold Haugh Award for Excellence in Studio Teaching. He and his students presented a recital series of the complete solo works of Chopin in nine concerts. His current and former students include prizewinners in international competitions, and his former students hold important teaching positions throughout the United States. Visit arthurgreene.com





CHRISTOPHER HARDING, Chair and Professor of Piano Performance at the University of Michigan, maintains an international career, presenting solo, concerto, and chamber music performances in venues as far-flung as the Kennedy Center and Phillips Collection in Washington, D.C., Suntory Hall in Tokyo, Seoul Art Center (IBK and Recital Halls), the National Theater Concert Hall in Taipei, as well as in Canada, mainland China, Israel, Italy, Russia, and Romania. His concerto performances have included concerts with the National Symphony and the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestras, San Angelo and Santa Barbara Symphonies, and the Tokyo City Philharmonic. As a duo partner and chamber musician, he has collaborated with such renowned artists as Karl Leister and András Adorján, and members of the St. Lawrence and Ying String Quartets, as well as his many distinguished colleagues at Michigan. Harding has presented numerous master classes and lecture recitals across the United States, Europe, and many parts of Asia. He has held a Fulbright Senior Specialist residency at Seoul National University, simultaneously holding a Special Chair in Piano of Piano Performance at Ewha Womans University, and is a permanent guest professor at the Sichuan Conservatory in Chengdu, China. He has taken 25 first prizes in national and international competitions and in 1999 was awarded the special "Mozart Prize" at the Cleveland International Piano Competition. He has edited several volumes of the music of Debussy and Mozart for the Schirmer Performance Editions. His recordings and live performances of American solo piano music (Barber, Bolcom, Gershwin, Copland), the violin and piano sonatas of Johannes Brahms (with violinist Stephen Boe), the complete piano chamber music of Franz Xaver Mozart, and American flute music (with Amy Porter) can be found on YouTube and at christopherhardingpiano.com

Since winning the gold medal at the first Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition, DOUGLAS HUMPHERYS' concert career has spanned four decades across four continents. A Steinway Artist, he has performed solo concerts and taught masterclasses throughout Asia, including twenty tours of China, plus engagements in Hong Kong, Taiwan, and Korea. As Founder of the International Center for Music at Park University in Kansas City, he is both Artistic Director and professor of piano, while also teaching at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music. Recently, his contributions to the field of music education were recognized with the prestigious appointment to The Fundación Banco Santander Piano Chair at the Reina Sofía School of Music in Madrid, Spain.





Pianist OLGA KERN is recognized as one of the great artists of her generation, captivating audiences and critics alike. 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Student Biographies



Nineteen-year-old **Harrison Jude Benford** is a first-year piano performance major in the studio of concert pianist Antonio Pompa-Baldi at the Cleveland Institute of Music. He began studying piano at age five and credits much of his development as a musician to Nancy O'Neill Breth of Washington, D.C. He has been a recitalist at Kennedy Center's Millennium Stage, Merkin Concert Hall, The Mansion at Strathmore, Levine Music Center, and the Steinway Gallery Annex. He is the first prize recipient in many international and national competitions including MTNA Senior Duet, the Rubato International Piano Competition, the Nora Lichtenberg Piano Scholarship Competition, AAMS International Piano Competition, and the Ylda Novik Memorial Concerto Competition. Harrison has participated in masterclasses and worked with such esteemed musicians such as Emanuel Ax, John O'Conor, Ann Schein, Arnaldo Cohen, Jean-Louis Haguenauer, Edward Auer, Yakov Kasman, Brian Ganz, and Blair McMillen, to name a few. Harrison takes great pleasure in collaborative piano and community outreach, and along with other musicians has brought live music to civic and senior centers throughout the greater Washington D.C. area. One of Harrison's greatest joys is spending each summer collaborating with other musicians at summer music camps and festivals including Interlochen, Tanglewood (BUTI) and Greenwood, the camp that sparked his love for chamber music. Harrison has played in many trios, quartets, and quintets, and he ultimately aspires to become a conservatory professor of piano and music theory.



Charismatic and popular with audiences in recital and concerto settings, **Huiping Cai**, age 26, is an engaging pianist known for her lyricism, musicality, and formidable technique. After winning First Prize, Best Concerto Award, and Best Recital Award at the 2017 Philadelphia International Piano Competition, she also won first prizes at the 2018 Miami Music Festival Piano Concerto Competition, the 2019 Chopin International Piano Competition in Hartford, CT, the 2022 Los Angeles International Liszt Competition, and the 2023 New York Franz Liszt International Piano Competition. As a soloist, she has performed across the United States and worldwide including Mexico, Russia, Kazakhstan, and her home country, China. She performed piano concertos with Evergreen Symphony Orchestra, Hong Kong VTC Symphony Orchestra, Jalisco Philharmonic Orchestra, Kazakhstan National Symphony Orchestra, Miami Music Festival Orchestra, Orchestra of St. Luke's, Shenzhen Symphony Orchestra, and Temple University Symphony Orchestra. Huiping received her MM in Piano Performance from New England Conservatory where she studied with Dang Thai Son and held a Teaching Assistantship. She is currently pursuing her DMA in Piano Performance & Literature under the tutelage of Alan Chow at the Eastman School of Music, along with her MM in Piano Accompanying & Chamber Music. Bingjian Chen, born in 2003, began to play the piano at six years old and was performing by the age of ten. She entered the Middle School affiliated with the Shanghai Conservatory of Music at the age of twelve and finished her high school diploma there. In 2022 she was admitted into the Colburn Conservatory of Music and she is pursuing her Bachelor's degree there now, under Fabio Bidini. Bingjian has performed both as a soloist and a chamber musician in venues like Herbst Theatre in San Francisco, Shanghai Heluting Concert Hall, Xiamen Concert Hall, Rocca Sforzesca, and CCTV (China Central Television). She has taken lessons and masterclasses with Alan Chow, Meng-Chieh Liu, Yoshikazu Nagai, Jin Ju, Jean-Yves Thibaudet, and Anna Sheludko at the Saint-Petersburg Conservatory of Music, with whom she takes regular online lessons. Bingjian graduated from middle school with excellent grades. Most recently, in 2023, she won first prize in the Artciál Piano Competition and the Royal Piano Competition.



Celine Chen, age 20, is in her second year at the University of Southern California, where she studies piano with Bernadene Blaha and flute with Catherine Karoly. As a 2022 Grand Prize winner of the Young Musicians Inspiring Change International Competition, Celine was one of six instrumentalists invited to play a benefit concert at Carnegie Hall. She has also been awarded prizes from MTNA National Competitions, The Music Center's Spotlight, the Celia Mendez Young Pianists Beethoven Competition, and the Kaufman Music Center International Youth Piano Competition. Other honors include the Colburn School Herbert Zipper Scholar Award, the William Grant Still Arts Center Scholarship, and the National YoungArts Merit Award. An avid chamber musician, Celine and her piano trio have won prizes in the Pasadena Conservatory of Music Chamber Music Competition and the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition. At USC, Celine works as a research assistant at the Brain and Creativity Institute, where she is currently working on several projects that explore the relationship between music and the brain. She hopes her work will have future applications to musicians and non-musicians alike.





Born in Taiwan, 20-year-old pianist **Huan-Ching Chou** has won several international piano competitions, most recently the Philadelphia International Piano Competition in 2021. In the past few years, performing as an active soloist and collaborative pianist, he has given recitals at The Kosciuszko Foundation under the "Salon De Virtuosi" series in NewYork City, the Steinway Piano Gallery in Toronto, and the Academy of Vocal Arts in Philadelphia. Always a determined musician, Huan-Ching has attended and performed at numerous summer festivals, including the Philadelphia Young Pianists' Academy and the Gijón International Piano Festival in Spain. Samuel Goldfarb, age 19, is a passionate pianist who has been dedicated to his craft since the age of three. Originally from Houston, Texas, he was a member of the Michael P. Hammond Preparatory Program at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music from early elementary school to high school graduation, studying primarily with Dr. Richard Marshall. He also studied piano at Kinder High School for the Performing and Visual Arts under the guidance of Rodolfo Morales. An avid competitor, Sam has won the Eleventh International Chopin Youth Competition (Chopin Society of Houston), as well as the Jan Ekier Award for Best Performance of the Most Difficult Piece (2019). In the same year, she won first prize in the 4th Thailand Steinway Youth Piano Competition 2023. Ariya started her piano lessons at the age of 4. She was a student of Dr. Pornphan Banternghansa and Dr. Christopher Janwong McKiggan at the Piano Academy of Bangkok. Since August 2021, Ariya has been under the tutelage of Christopher Harding at the University of Michigan. Ariya also performs actively as a soloist and chamber musician. Since 2021, Ariya has been a pianist of Trio Matisse, where she has been under the tutelage of Amy I-Lin Cheng. Their most recent achievements include being the first prize winner of the Southern Illinois Young Artist Organization 2023, first prize winner at the Briggs Chamber Music Competition 2022, the Grand Prize winner of the New York International Young Musician Competition 2022, second place at the MTNA Chamber Music Competition, and the Kronos Award at the Glass City Chamber Music Competition.
